# NEIGHBORHOOD SAFETY Elementary & Middle Student Report

Neighborhood Safety is a short version of the Self-Care Checklist—Child, a measure of children's emotional readiness for self-care and perceptions of neighborhood safety. The Self-Care Checklist—Child was created by Posner & Vandell for the Ecological Study of After-School Care, a 3-year study of low-income urban children, based on the parent version of the measure (Posner & Vandell, 1994). The Self-Care Checklist—Child contains two subscales, Home Safety Feelings and Neighborhood Safety; we used the Neighborhood Safety scale only. The response scale was modified for the Study of Promising After-School Programs (original: 1 = definitely no, 4 = definitely yes).

- 1. It is safe to walk around my neighborhood
- 2. There are people in my neighborhood who might hurt me
- 3. I feel safe playing outside at my house
- 4. Drug dealers are a problem in my neighborhood
- 5. It is safe in my neighborhood
- 6. I am scared of some of the people in my neighborhood
- 7. I worry about people with guns and knives in my neighborhood

### Response scale

- 1 = not at all true
- 2 = a little true
- 3 =somewhat true
- 4 = really true

## Scoring

Mean item score; items 2, 4, 6, 7 are reverse coded
